



IN THE ninety years of its life in Britain the Siamese cat has undergone many changes. It has taken on a more elegant shape and donned a coat of new colours. But its greatest and its strangest change has nothing to do with this: it is about the place of the Siamese cat in society.

Up to the turn of the century, and even well beyond, the Siamese cat was an oddity. Some people said it wasn't a cat all all: it was a rabbit; it was a monkey. Worse still, it was the devil, and there were those who would cross themselves at the sight of this slinky-eyed creature, and who would hide beneath the blankets at night at the sound of its high pitched unmelodious yowl.

Today it is almost a sign of a cultured home to have a Siamese cat. It has taken the place on the hearth of the Victorian non-descript Tabby. It is tailor-made for the well-run household. It is smooth, immaculate, in good taste; it fits. When one thinks of the things it used to get up to—and still on occasions does—the metamorphosis is unbelievable.

The truth is that beneath the cat's undoubted charm there lurks a vein of destruction, of low cunning (which betrays itself in thieving), of deception, of spitefulness even—which are all part of the Siamese character and at one time were undisputedly predominant.

Have then these traits been bred out? Hardly that, though temperament is something to which breeders pay considerable attention. The explanation lies more likely in the cat's remarkable ability to adapt itselt to its surroundings. It is very sensitive to everything that goes on, and particularly to the attitude, the actions and the voices of people. It does not imitate so much as emulate. It has an understanding which goes far deeper than that of most creatures. It senses human passions to an astonishing eper than that of most creatures. It human passions to an astonishing

Over the years, and throughout all the changes brought about by the art of the breeder, the cat, unaided, has adapted itself to a new way of life—our modern way of life. There is little more to it than that.

The result is that the strange cat which came to Britain from Siam around 1880, highly charged with an aura of oriental magic, is today, whether as a pet or as a show animal, the homeliest of all creatures, an integral part of the family.

integral part of the family.

Plenty of romance and mystery there certainly was about those early Siamese. They were the treasured gifts of the high-bred; they had a close association with the departed souls of kings; they had their place alongside the priests in the temples. Even the physical characteristics of those early imports had been acquired in astonishing ways. A princess on her way to bathe had put her precious ring on her cat's tail and then tied a knot to remind her of something (maybe to get dressed before returning to the palace!) Hence the kink in the Siamese tail! The squint in the eye, which affected some people as does the harmless broomstick, had come from the perpetual vigilance of a lone cat over a gold and jewelled ornament on the dimly-lighted altar of a high temple.

ornament on the dimly-lighted altar of a high temple.
Fascinating stories abounded. It was almost a pity when, in 1901, the Siamese ambassador in London confirmed that there was no Royal Cat of Siam, that the King did not keep cats, that the Legation had no Siamese and that, indeed, the breed was rare in Siam where, believe it or not, the Tabby ruled the roof!

The Siamese cats which came to Britain in the 1880's, and for many years after, were of two distinct varieties. The 'Royal' was pale coated with seal points. I had blue eyes. The 'chocolate' was darker all over and had

The 'chocolate' was darker all over all law orange eyes.

The Siamese Cat Club, formed in 1902, drew up a standard for both Royals and Chocolates, but urged from the beginning the breeding of the pale coloured blue-eyed cat. This was the variety which ultimately won the day and became the basis of the Seal Pointed Siamese as we know it today.

They 'made' the cat and they made it in Britain. The Siamese cat of today is as British as the Sherwood Forest oak. These

improvements have amounted almost to a change in the whole cat. Conformation has become finer. The big heavy Siamese of former times are no more. The squint has largely disappeared (though even the top cats will occasionally show it in moments of anger or intense concentration: old characteristics after all, die hard). At one time there was more than a sprinkling of white spotting on toes and feet: it marred the colour of points if nothing more. That, too, has gone. As for the kink? Well, most of today's authorities are 'agin' it, so who is the present writer to mourn its passing? Actually it does not merit disqualification on the show bench, but generally it is frowned upon even when it is a mere suggestion at the very tip of the tail.

And, of course, there have been new colours. To the Seal Point has been added the Blue Point, the Chocolate Point, the Lilac Point, the Red Point, the Tabby and the Tortie Points. "Dilutions" if not infinite are not yet exhausted. Type, in all the colours, is the same, though there are important differences in degree of body colour and in the blue eye colour.

The Siamese has been the intensive study and the enduring joy of some very notable people in the cat Fancy. One thinks of Phyl Wade, Mrs Duncan Hindley, Kathleen Williams, Elsie Kent (Mrs Hart), the Denhams . . . But how invidious to mention the few when there are today so many. It seems to have a particular attraction for writers and publishers—Sir Compton Mackenzie, Mr Michael Joseph. There really is something uniquely appealing about the Siamese cat. The person who is thinking of buying a Siamese cat is urged to get in touch with a successful and established breeder, and, generally speaking, to buy a kitten rather than a grown cat. Buy a 'well bred' kitten even if the intention is merely to add another member to the family rather than to go In for exhibition. 'Pedigree' shows on the hearth as well as on the show bench.

Neutering of a male kitten—preferably between trees and fine peoples.

Neutering of a male kitten—preferably between three and five months of age—and the spaying of a female, will be advisable in many cases. Siamese are prolific and unwanted kittens are just what the adjective implies. So don't have them.

implies. So don't have them.

It is prudent for the prospective owner of a Siamese to know something about the cat before the kitten is actually purchased. Literature is plentiful. Excellent books including Kathleen Williams 'Siamese Cats', (Foyles) and May Eustace's vastly informative 'The Royal Cat of Siam' (Pelham Books), but there is nothing quite so down to earth as

The prospective owner should also have seen his Siamese at a show or in the home of a breeder and should have a picture of it in his mind. It is not necessary at this stage to learn the standard by heart, but he should know that the Siamese is a cat medium in size, long and swelte in body, slim legged and with the hind legs characteristically rather higher than the front ones. The tail should be long and tapered and the head typically wedge-shaped with width between the eyes narrowing in perfectly straight lines to a fine muzzle. And then there are the unforgettable olue eyes. The coat should be 'short and fine in texture, glossy and close lying' and about the whole cat there should be a clear 'expression of alertness and intelligence.'

Your Siamese, in short, is a creature of striking appearance. He is a jungle animal who has somehow crept indoors overnight and decided to stay. He has strength, speed, agility: he also has languid grace. His voice may be a little surprising, but he comes as near to talking as any creature outside the human race.

READERS MAKE RULES MORE DIFFICULT TO BEND

THE proposed ruling that no cat or kitten (entire or neuter) with one or both parents unregistered shall be eligible for open classes at championship shows needs more than re-consideration.

than re-consideration.

A similar proposal about three years ago resulted in Miss Hardman withdrawing her fine cat Ch Killinghall Red Bon Bon from the show bench (until the proposal was withdrawn) and several of the others with unregistered sires suddenly appearing with a daddy after all!

These sires had a wonderful collection of names to legitimise their sons and daughters and helped to keep these 'pedigree' offspring on the show bench. Some of us watched this mushroom-like growth of stud cats who sprang up overnight with much amusement at their names and marvelled at their owners' duplicity. Obviously the same thing will happen again.

The proposal, if it must be made, should read 'no cat or kitten (entire or neuter) with one or both parents and grandparents and great-grandparents unregistered shall be eligible for open classes at championship shows.'

eligible for open classes at championship shows.'

This mainly affects the British cat. Anyone feeling proud of their British cat with no known pedigree on one or both sides can always show it as a household pet (providing it Isn't registered). Or, they could register it and plod on industriously breeding for three or four generations until they have a known pedigree to make their efforts worth while.

The AOV owners who have never been able to compete for challenge certificates, despite owning and breeding cats and kittens with known pedigrees for several generations, will gladly encourage their efforts and urge them on.

It has never ceased to amaze me that any-

body's queen who 'gets out', be she Longhair, British Shorthair or Foreign Shorthair, can have her offspring entered as a British kitten if it remotely resembles one instead of being entered for competition as a household pet.

of being entered for competition as a household pet.

When adult, this same offspring, despite its doubtful lineage, can then compete for and win challenge certificates and could eventually end up as a champion at stud.

The AOV owners, in the meantime, cannot even enter their legitimate cats in so much as the breeders' class, visitors class or any other class except their open AOV unless they have joined a club which caters for the breed. They depend on cat clubs kindly putting on a miscellaneous AOV class before they can show their cats and kittens at all.

Show rules state that cats and kittens must be entered in two classes. Show rules also state that AOV's can only compete in classes nominated for AOV's. No such restrictions are placed on mongrel or half mongrel cats!

We shall not change human nature, but at

we shall not change human nature, but at least we can make the proposed ruling, if it is considered necessary, more difficult to bend by owners and breeders with personal ambitions to win coloured cards with half or wholly mongrel cats in breed classes, by insisting on three known generations before a cat can compete in open classes.

Maybe then such cats will end up where they deserve to be—much-loved neutered pets on a family hearth. Or, they can be kept at home being bred from with a view to perfecting a breed instead of being trotted out (continued on page 719)

IMMUNISATION

IT IS very gratifying to see an official notice in FUR AND FEATHER with reference to 'compulsory inoculation prior to the exhibition of cats and kittens'. Vaccination of cats against Panleucopenia is a very debatable subject; also whether the vaccination has 'taken' cannot, I understand, be proved.

An outbreak of Panleucopenia is seldom heard of and when it is, seems to be in 'over catted' catteries. My contention is that more emphasis should be put on good feeding, healthy conditions, and a limited number of cats.

As indicated in FUR AND FEATHER of July 23 the Governing Council of the Cat Fancy still has under consideration the proposal that no cat or kitten should be admitted to an approved show that is certified to have been immunised against Feline Panleucopenia.

Panleucopenia.

Although this may be an ideal to be aimed at, in my view it is premature and assumes an effectiveness and safety that many veterinary surgeons would not endorse. Three veterinary surgeons of my acquaintance do not advise the inoculation of adult cats of three years and over, nor booster inoculations of older kittens and young adult cats other than Slamese and then, if considered to be at increased risk.

'Instant legislation' is to be deployed and

to be at increased risk.

'Instant legislation' is to be deplored and much more investigation is needed before a mandatory rule is made.

It would be difficult for some owners to prove that their adult cats have been immunised. If a rule is required at present! suggest that it should take the form that all kittens born after 1 August 1970, should be immunised and the form or forms of immunisation intended should be defined.
